There are several Social Security programs which benefit persons with disabilities. Supplemental Security Income (SSI) makes monthly payments to the aged, blind and disabled who are 18 or older and who have limited income and financial reserves. Children who are blind or disabled are eligible depending on family income. Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) is paid to a disabled person (who has worked in employment covered by Social Security) or their family when the disabled person is no longer able to work due to the disability. Social Security Administration (SSA) benefits are payable to a disabled adult child of a disabled retiree or a deceased worker at any age if the child's disability began before age 22.

Through monitoring, advocacy, capacity building and systemic change, SCDD works to achieve a consumer and family-based system of individualized services, supports, and other assistance. SCDD Bay Area Office also leads the National Core Indicators efforts across nine counties, the Movers Longitudinal Study surveys, and supports People First chapters within the Bay Area.

We serve over 500 individuals with mild to profound disabilities. The Arc has responded to the changing needs of our community-Alameda County. We provide services for toddlers from 2-5 yrs. Of age. Adults(18+) can participate in vocational or life skills training, employment development, computer workshops and more.

We provide the following services at this time:

FIRST STEPS CHILDREN'S CENTER—Integrated childcare to children with and without special needs. Professional educators provide a stimulating, nurturing and safe environment for children from two years through kindergarten age. First Step uses a progressive approach to learning-by understanding the developmental needs of each child, we create an individual learning plan. Our curriculum has had proven success in maximizing children's learning abilities and social skills.

VOCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT SERVICES— The Arc of Alameda County operates Vocational Development Centers throughout the East Bay. Adults who have intellectual and developmental disabilities perform both large and small subcontract work-real work earning pay. The Vocational Development Centers, with their emphasis on pre-vocational training, prepare individuals to transition into community-based employment services, if desired by the individual.

ALTERNATIVE VENTURES AND ALTERNATIVES— This is a 5 day a week program for individuals over the age of 18 who wish to partake in programming that is both on site and in the community. Participants should be motivated for volunteer, social, recreational, life skills, and community building skills sets. Daily exercise, stamina/movement development is strongly encouraged. Occasional paid work may be provided.

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES- The Arc of Alameda County provides extensive one-on-one training and job related support in community employment sites. There is ongoing follow-up support as needed, to ensure continued success. The Arc identifies and develops employment opportunities for individual and group placements.

ADULT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM-The Arc of Alameda County's adult development program, called SCOPE, teaches people who have severe to profound disabilities basic learning skills such as personal safety, community access, grooming and hygiene. The goal is to ensure that all individuals reach their full potential in natural, social environments and gain the experience of being a valued member of the community in which we live.

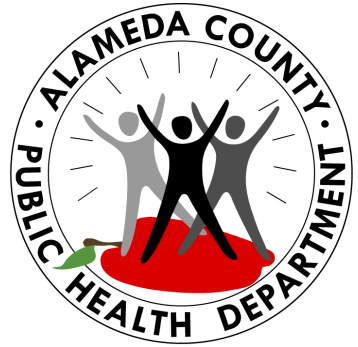
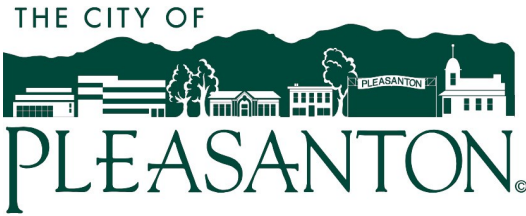

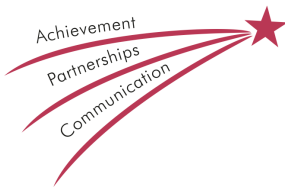
